1. The club held its annual picnic at the Mill Mountain Zoo. The members munched on fried chicken and all the trimmings. After lunch they took a tour and enjoyed looking at all the animals, birds, reptiles, and small animals. They donated \$100 to the Zoo and another \$100 to Make-a-Wish Foundation.

2. Club held an Area 6 Meeting with their sister club from Roanoke. Kay Greene was elected to be Area Director for the upcoming year.

ROANOKE CLUB

While this club works very hard raising money for their many service projects, they still find time to have fun. They went to the Salem Avalanche baseball game.

They have started a new fellowship program. On the third Tuesday of each month, the club meets for a dutch treat dinner at one of the restaurants that has one or more candy boxes.

They started a membership contest and split up into four teams named after football teams. So far the club has initiated 4 new members as a result of the contest.

During the period April to September the club donated over \$25,000 to various needy organizations including \$5,000 to Brain Injury Services with a \$5,000 matching grant from our Chesapeake Foundation to purchase book bags and computers to school age children with brain injuries.

Club has promised to support Governor John Markey by forming a new Senior club and a new Junior club in the first 90 days of his administration. Club Building Teams are busy spotting possible locations.

SELLING FRUITCAKE

So your club has decided to sell Claxton fruitcake?

First, you must have a planning meeting to appoint a fruitcake chairman who will order and distribute the fruitcake to the members. Members decide to whom they can sell the fruitcake. One approach is to sell individually to all the friends of the club. Why not set a goal for the club to sell 10 to 100 pounds each. Ten pounds each in a thirty-member club is 300 pounds! A club of this size should be able to sell 100 pounds apiece, and that is 3,000 pounds! Your club should decide on the price of the fruitcake for retail sales, for instance, \$4.00 per pound. The wholesale cost per pound to your club is \$2.06. There will also be shipping charges which will be in addition to the wholesale price. Your profit on \$4.00 before shipping is \$1.94 per pound.

The fruitcake chairman should order one-pound fruitcakes, as they are the easiest to handle. Each club member should place his/her order with the chairman by a certain date. The chairman then orders the fruitcake from Claxton and informs the members when they arrive and are ready for pickup. Each club member should be responsible for picking up and signing out their fruitcake from the chairman.

Thanksgiving is a good first date for your club to focus on to get their cakes out to people. The chairman should ask for monies from cakes sold and projected orders by December 1. A second order of fruitcake should be made by about December 5, and that amount of fruitcake distributed for Christmas sales.

All monies should be turned in to the fruitcake chairman by January 5, and all bills should be paid by the 15th of January. It would be a good idea to hold a meeting in February to go over how everything went, and discuss what could be done differently and/or better for the next year. As you know, this is the major fundraiser of Civitan International. The proceeds from fruitcake sales go to the Chesapeake District and your club to help in their endeavors to benefit children with developmental disabilities. So we urge you to take part in this Civitan project to the best of your ability.

MASTER SPONSORSHIP TEAM (MST)

The Member Sponsorship Team Pin is issued to a Civitan who distinguishes himself or herself as a super recruiter. The two ways a member earns honor roll recognition are:

1. The Civitan sponsored 4 or more members in the previous fiscal year
2. The Civitan has sponsored 50 or more members earning life member status as a MST

When a Civitan sponsors 4 or more members in the previous fiscal year, he or she keeps the recognition for the next fiscal year. However to remain on the MST honor roll he or she must sponsor 4 or more members during the next fiscal year. Once a Civitan has sponsored 50 members he or she earns life member status as an MST.

Civitan members recognized on the Distinguished Sponsorship Team (DST) have sponsored a minimum of 150 members. DST is a very prestigious symbol to appear after a Civitan's name. Currently there are 12 members who are on the DST honor roll. Our own Syd Fishman from the Rockville Club is one of those 15 distinguished members.

Junior clubs are in the works for Patrick Henry High in Roanoke, another one in Tacoma Park Middle School, Silver Spring—sponsored by Arlington Civitan Club and Longfellow Middle school and Cooper Middle School.

The Juniors have promised Governor Markey that they would form a senior club this year!

This will already give us 4 senior clubs and we are well on our way to achieving the goals that Governor Markey set for the year.

"Whatever the mind of man can CONCEIVE and BELIEVE can be ACHIEVED!" This was the motto of Clem Stone who built an insurance empire on this slogan. Stone conceived it. His employees believed it and together they achieved it. Can this be said of your club's year by September 2007?

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

John Markey

Fellow Civitans, thank you for the high honor of allowing me to serve you this year.

As you probably know by now, I am a firm believer in setting goals. I was convinced a long time ago that unless you have goals in your life, you become a wandering generality. When you set doable goals, you become a meaningful specific! You see, goals are what make life exciting. Goals are what makes you get out of bed in the morning with a spring in your step. Goals are what keep you going all day in spite of what obstacles life puts in your path that day.

Elsewhere in this newsletter is a copy of the goals I set for our district this year. Some of them are simple goals like having each club develop a mission statement. Does your club know why it is in existence? A mission statement will clarify what your club is and why you are a Civitan club. It sure does help when someone asks you "What is a Civitan club and what do you do?" -

Some of the goals look large to you, like forming 5 new senior clubs and doing it before the end of our first 6 months. What you say, "It has never been done before in the history of our district!" What does that have to do with it? I have spent the last 9 months looking over our district and I see so many opportunities. You know, some people look at a ROSE BUSH and see THORNS! Other people look at a THORN BUSH and see ROSES! Fellow Civitans, there are rose bushes all over our territory, just waiting to bloom.

All it takes is for each of us to catch the vision. Clem Stone, president of Combined Insurance had a slogan. "WHATEVER THE MIND OF MAN CAN CONCEIVE AND BELIEVE, CAN BE ACHIEVED!" With that slogan, he built an insurance empire. He CONCEIVED it, his employees BELIEVED it and together they ACHIEVED it.

You see, once you conceive the concept, then you break it down into manageable levels. Our district has 6 Area Directors. All each Area Director has to do is find one club in his area to form a club and it is done!

The same thing with Junior clubs and Campus clubs. When you go into a prospective area and state I AM GOING TO BUILD A CLUB IN THIS TOWN!!!! Things begin to happen. Not only do they get out of your way, they actually offer to help you. So Area Directors, one of your goals for this next 6 months is to build a new Senior, Junior and Campus club in your area. See how easy the job is?

I looked around the district this past 9 months and I circled 60 locations for new clubs in our district. I envisioned a 5 to 10 year plan of building new clubs. If each location pans out, we will have built 60 new clubs in that 10 year period. Isn't that exciting? Talk about bragging rights at International conventions! When I was in the life insurance business, we were taught to have the names of 10 people to go see. Out of those 10 suspects, you would get 2 prospects. Out of those 2 prospects, you would get one sale. Out of that one sale, you ask that person for the names of 10 people and you start the cycle all over again.

Sometimes the reason we don't succeed is we start with TOO FEW prospects. We start with one or two prospects and when we get shot down; we say "That's it. It can't be done!" and go home with our tail between our legs.

In your home or office there sits an address book. It is either on your desk or on your computer. In your address book are the names, addresses and telephone numbers of your friends, relatives, merchants you do business with or call on for assistance. In your book are doctors, lawyers, bankers, repairmen, realtors, church friends and stock brokers. In your book are the names of restaurants, beauty shops, barber shops, funeral homes, car dealers, dry cleaners, contractors, city officials, county officials and golfing or bowling buddies and more.

Will you ask yourself something? Will you ask yourself this question? Did I ever share Civitan with them? Did I ever tell them about this wonderful club that I belong to that is doing so much in our community for people with developmental disabilities? Did I ever share with them about my Research Center in Birmingham with over 300 scientists that are working to find a cure for mental retardation? Did I ever share with them the great work that Dr. Sondheimer is doing with the venom from a scorpion that is being used to kill the bad cancer cells and not the good cells?

Have I shared with them about the grant that my district gave to the Research Center for a brain imaging machine that will be checking the brain waves of children with mental retardation?

Have I ever invited them to one of my meetings so they could see the fine caliber of people that I hang around with? Did I ever invite them to one of my club's social engagements so he and his spouse could see the wonderful people that he or she would be hanging around with when they join?

When I went to service my candy boxes, did I ever take them with me, so they could see one of the ways our club earns money? When I lugged fruit cakes into my stores, did I ever take them along to see how we raise money? When my club held a picnic or a Christmas party or a Clergy week Appreciation program did I invite them to join me? Did I offer to pick them up?

Yes, I did. Some of them turned me down. Some of them said they were too busy. Some of them said, "That is not my cup of tea." Some of them said "they did not want to get involved." But you know, by using the old 10-2-1 insurance rule, some of them said YES! SOME of them became Civitans and they were thankful for my asking them. Some of them are now my CLOSET friends.

Are my goals doable?

I believe it can be done. I believe there are people out there who want to help us make it a better world through Civitan. We just need to get out our little telephone directory and start inviting.

Can we form 5 new senior clubs? Of course we can. We still need that 10-2-1 rule. We need to make a list of 10 areas that should have a Civitan club. We are going to get shot down 8 times, but 2 will say maybe and one will say YES!
